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PAST AND PRESENT UNITE WITH MASTERWORKS AND A WORLD PREMIERE AT DBDT'S CULTURAL AWARENESS SERIES PRESENTED BY WELLS FARGO

(February 11, 2015) *Dallas, TX* – Dallas Black Dance Theatre (DBDT) celebrates the richness of the African-American experience during Black History Month with its **Cultural Awareness** series February 20-22, at the Dee and Charles Wyly Theatre in the AT&T Performing Arts Center. Two solos, one by **Alvin Ailey** and the other by **Talley Beatty**, connect the audience to past classics, while newer works and a **world premiere** root the audience in the present.

Choreographed by the world renowned **Talley Beatty** in 1947, *Mourner's Bench* features a lone male who both grieves and celebrates the Black experience during the racially-charged 1920s. **Alvin Ailey's** *Reflections in D*, a solo, takes its title from the music accompaniment by **Duke Ellington**. The dance alternates between serene and percussive movements as it paints the iconic jazz score across the stage.

The world premiere of *Oremus*, choreographed by company dancer and resident choreographer **Richard A. Freeman, Jr.,** showcases all 12 company dancers. Latin for "prayer," this stunning new contemporary work draws influence from spiritual references as dancers investigate safety, boundaries, and belonging in the search for hope and answers. "It's an important work, I believe," said **DBDT Artistic Director April Berry**. "Richard has something to say every year, and he has ideas that are relevant. He doesn't look to other choreographic voices. He's original that way."

The performances also include two beloved modern works of DBDT's repertoire: *Lambarena*, choreographed by **Troy Powell**, Artistic Director of Ailey II, and *A Boundless Journey*, choreographed by Guggenheim Fellow **Dianne McIntyre**. Exploring the soaring motions of birds, *Lamberena* juxtaposes Western and African culture through a musical mesh of Bach and African sounds and rhythms, while McIntyre's ensemble work recapitulates the entire Black experience in America, from slavery to Jim Crow to civil rights.

For the fifth year, **Wells Fargo** returns as a presenting sponsor of the series. Performances open to the general public are Friday, February 20, at 7:30pm; Saturday, February 21, at 2:30pm and 7:30 pm; and Sunday, February 22, at 2:30 pm. In addition, two SOLD OUT Student Matinees will be held Thursday, February 19, for 1,000+ area schoolchildren.

New this series, DBDT will launch **All Access**, a new program of audience engagement activities after the evening performances. The **Friday evening Artist's Discussion** features resident choreographer **Richard A. Freeman, Jr.** in a conversation moderated by **Artistic Director April Berry**. The **Saturday evening** performance will be followed by a **DBDT Dance Party** with company dancers and a live DJ on the Wyly

stage (21 years and older welcome). Both events are complimentary with ticket purchase and include a cash bar.
