DALLAS BLACK DANCE THEATRE

Founded in 1976 by Ann Williams, the mission of Dallas Black Dance Theatre is to create and produce contemporary modern dance at its highest level of artistic excellence through performances and educational programs that bridge cultures and reach diverse communities. With an ever-expanding national and global audience, the company employs a diverse, multi-ethnic troupe of dancers performing for audiences of all ages and backgrounds.

Dallas Black Dance Theatre is the oldest, continuously operating professional dance company in Dallas. Under the direction of the Artistic Director Melissa M. Young, the contemporary company consists of 13 professional, full-time dancers performing a mixed repertory of modern, ballet, jazz, and ethnic works by nationally and internationally known choreographers. Over the course of its history, DBDT has performed for 4.5 million arts patrons and 2.7 million children worldwide (100,000 youth grades K–12 annually).

To keep up with demand and continue to serve its local community, Ann Williams formed DBDT: *Encore!* (formerly DBDT II), the second performing company of Dallas Black Dance Theatre in 2000. This company consists of ten classically trained and highly-skilled artists from around the nation. Since its inception, *Encore!* has grown in popularity and thrills audiences with its fresh allure. *Encore!* annually hosts its season performing in the Moody Performance Hall (formerly Dallas City Performance Hall).

Under the direction of Executive Director Zenetta Drew, a professional administrative staff of 15 full-time employees is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the company. Ms. Drew also works with a 50-member Board of Directors, whose primary responsibilities are fundraising and fiduciary oversight.

The 50-year old Dallas Black Dance Academy, founded in 1973, is the official school of Dallas Black Dance Theatre and offers classes (three levels each) in ballet, jazz, tap and other dance disciplines for ages four and up. DBDT's academy offers classes four evenings per week and Saturdays during the school year and summer. The academy trains 550+ students per week in year-round classes at the DBDT studios.

Moving to the Dallas Arts District continues the legacy of founder, Ann Williams. In January 2008, 2700 Flora Street, the historic prior residence of the Moorland YMCA became the first permanent home for DBDT's rehearsal studios, training classrooms, and administrative offices.

In October of 2014, the 2700 block of Flora Street was officially renamed Ann Williams Way in honor of the lifelong work of Williams.

Dallas Black Dance Theatre was designated as an American Masterpiece Touring Artist in 2008 by the National Endowment for the Arts and is proud to be the recipient of the coveted 2017 Texas Medal of Arts award for opening doors for artistic and educational opportunity for Texans of all ages from the Texas Cultural Trust. In August 2021, Dallas Black Dance Theatre made its Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival debut. *LIKE WATER* by the award-winning choreographer Darrell Grand Moultrie was commissioned by Jacob's Pillow as the inaugural recipient of the Joan B. Hunter New Work Commission.

Dallas Black Dance Theatre is a resident company member of the AT&T Performing Arts Center – Dee and Charles Wyly Theatre.

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



MELISSA M. YOUNG

Melissa M. Young is a Honduran American raised in Santa Ana, California. She attended Orange Coast College with a focus in Business Administration. She is a graduate of The Ailey School— The Official School of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater in New York City. During her Fellowship studies, she was one of five students selected to train as an exchange student at Amsterdam University of the Arts in the Netherlands.

Melissa is celebrating her twenty-ninth season with Dallas Black Dance Theatre (DBDT). Young started her career at DBDT as a dancer for eleven years, then moved up the ranks as Rehearsal Director, Academy Director, Associate Artistic Director, and Interim Artistic Director. Her most notable performances include The Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center Out-of-Doors, and for the U.S. Ambassadors to Ireland and Zimbabwe. She has restaged and rehearsed the diverse repertoire of DBDT, which spans over 100 ballets. She was an Assistant to the Choreographers, Hope Clarke for The Dallas Opera's *Porgy and Bess* and Christopher L. Huggins for Dallas Theater Center's production of *The Wiz.* Melissa is most proud of thoughtfully leading DBDT through the pandemic by using the many restrictions as a guide to push the boundaries of her imagination into a creative reality.

Teaching master classes both nationally and internationally, Melissa specializes in the Dance Technique of Lester Horton. She was the primary Horton Technique Instructor for the Dallas Black Dance Theatre company dancers from 1998–2017. As an Adjunct Instructor, she has taught at Southern Methodist University, Texas Woman's University, and Abilene Christian University. Over the years, she has led several movement workshops for Leadership North Texas and Leadership Dallas.

Melissa is a graduate of the Leadership Arts Institute, Class of 2022, a program of Business Council for the Arts in Dallas County. She is a member of the International Association of Blacks in Dance, Inc. Melissa has served as an advisory panelist for arts organizations that include the City of Dallas Office of Arts and Culture, Texas Commission on the Arts and Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation, and is a former board member for the Dance Council of North Texas.

Melissa was presented with The Dancer's Award in 2000 for her artistic excellence and dedication to Dallas Black Dance Theatre. She was chosen as one of "The Talented Tenth" by The Dallas Weekly in 2010 for being a Young and Emerging Leader. In 2014, she received an Award of Recognition from the South Dallas Dance Festival for her service to dance, and in 2016, the Natalie Skelton Award for Artistic Excellence. In 2017, Melissa received the Shining Star Award from the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance for her significant contributions to dance in Texas and beyond. During the 57th Annual South Central District Conference of the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. in 2019, Melissa was honored with the "We Speak Your Name" Career Achievement Award.

CHOREOGRAPHER BIOS



Born and raised in New York City, Gregory received his dance training at the Alvin Ailey School, then graduated cum laude from SUNY Purchase dance conservatory. He debuted his own company, The DASH Ensemble, in December 2010 at The JOYCE SoHo. DASH Company performance credits include The JOYCE Theater, Baryshnikov Arts Center, New York Live Arts, Guggenheim Works and Process Series, Kaatsbaan, Joe's Pub, Central Park Summerstage, Tribeca Film Festival, Venice Biennale in Madison Square Park, Bryant Park Dance Fest, as well as domestic touring all over the U.S. including Dallas, L.A., and North Carolina. Gregory, in partnership with dance

education specialist Lindsey Pettus, is also the co-founder of The DASH Academy. He has been commissioned for original works by American Ballet Theater, including exclusive creations for Jeffrey Cirio, Daniil Simkin, and Hee Seo. Ballet commissions also include Atlanta Ballet, St. Louis Ballet, and Ballet Austin. He was the recipient of the highly selective Footprints commission at American Dance Festival, and most recently for Limón Dance Company's newly formed Limón 2. Awards for Choreography include Hubbard Street 2 International Competition, Ballet Austin's New American Talent, and Northwest Dance Project's Pretty Creatives. Commissions for Contemporary/ Rep companies include LA Contemporary Dance Co., Owen/Cox in Kansas City, Dark Circles CD in Dallas, TU Dance in MPLS and Northwest Dance Project in Portland, OR. His collegiate and training program commissions include Juilliard, Princeton, Point Park, LINES Ballet, BODYTRAFFIC Summer Study, MOVENYC YP & S.W.E.A.T programs, NYU, SUNY Purchase, Earl Mosely's Diversity of Dance, University of Minnesota, Fordham/ Ailey, Montclair State, and SAM Houston State. Faculty positions include Broadway Dance Center, Gibney Dance, The Martha Graham School, Ballet Hispánico, Dallas Black Dance Theatre, and Peridance Capezio Center. Adjunct positions held at SUNY Purchase and The Hartt School. He has conducted multiple masterclasses around the country including Juilliard, NYU, UNCSA, The Hartt School, Ballet Hispánico, UC Irvine, SUNY Purchase, Point Park, Booker T Washington HSPVA, OCSA and HSPVA in Houston. In addition, Gregory, alongside fellow choreographer Loni Landon, is the co-founder of The PlaygroundNYC, a choreographic initiative that was voted 25 to Watch in 2013 by Dance Magazine.



DONALD McKAYLE

Professor Donald McKayle, recipient of honors and awards in every aspect of his illustrious career, has been named by the Dance Heritage Coalition "one of America's Irreplaceable Dance Treasures: the first 100." His choreographic masterworks, considered modern dance classics, GAMES, RAINBOW 'ROUND MY SHOULDER, DISTRICT STORYVILLE, and SONGS OF THE DISINHERITED are performed around the world. He has choreographed over a hundred works for dance companies in the United States, Canada, Israel, Europe, and South America. The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Cleveland Ballet, San Francisco Ballet, Ballet San Jose Silicon Valley, the

Dayton Contemporary Dance Company, Lula Washington Dance Theatre and Cleo Parker Robinson Dance Ensemble serve as repositories for his works. He was Artistic Mentor for the José Limón Dance Company. Ten retrospectives have honored his choreography. In April 2005, Donald McKayle was honored at the John F. Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. and presented with a medal as a Master of African American Choreography. In 2001, he choreographed the monumental ten-hour production of TANTALUS, produced by the Royal Shakespeare Company in collaboration with the

CHOREOGRAPHER BIOS

Denver Center Theatre Company. Five Tony Nominations and Tony Awards have honored his choreography for Broadway musical theater: SOPHISTICATED LADIES, DOCTOR JAZZ, A TIME'FÓR SINGING, GOLDEN BOY, and for RAISIN, which garnered the Tony Award as Best Musical, and for which he received Tony nominations for both direction and choreography. For SOPHISTICATED LADIES he was also honored with an Outer Critics Circle Award and the NAACP Image Award. His most recent choreography for Broadway was showcased in IT AIN'T NOTHIN' BUT THE BLUES, which earned a Tony nomination for Best Musical. He received an Emmy nomination for the TV Special, FREE TO BE... YOU AND ME. In dance he has received the Capezio Award, the Samuel H. Scripps/American Dance Festival Award, the American Dance Guild Award, a Living Legend Award from the National Black Arts Festival, the Heritage Award from the California Dance Educators Association, two Choreographer Fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Dance/USA Honors, an Irvine Fellowship in Dance, the Martha Hill Lifetime Achievement Award, the Annual Award from the Dance Masters of America, the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Dance Under the Stars Choreography Festival, the Black College Dance Exchange Honors, the Dance Magazine Award, and the American Dance Legacy Institute's Distinguished and Innovative Leadership Award, among others.



MATTHEW RUSHING

Matthew Rushing was born in Los Angeles, California. He began his dance training with Kashmir Blake in Inglewood, California, and continued his training at the Los Angeles County High School for the Arts. He is the recipient of a Spotlight Award and a Dance Magazine Award and was named a Presidential Scholar in the Arts. He was a scholarship student at The Ailey School and later became a member of Ailey II. During his career Mr. Rushing has performed as a guest artist for galas in Vail, Colorado, as well as in Austria, Canada, France, Italy, and Russia. He has performed for Presidents George H. W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush, and Barack Obama, as well as at the 2010 White House Dance Series.

During his time with the Company he has choreographed four ballets: Acceptance In Surrender (2005), a collaboration with Hope Boykin and Abdur-Rahim Jackson; Uptown (2009), a tribute to the Harlem Renaissance; ODETTA (2014), a celebration of "the queen of American folk music"; and Testament (2020), a tribute to Alvin Ailey's Revelations created in collaboration with Clifton Brown and Yusha-Marie Sorzano. In 2012 he created Moan, which was set on Philadanco and premiered at The Joyce Theater. Mr. Rushing joined the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater in 1992, became Rehearsal Director 2010, and became Associate Artistic Director in January 2020.

Donald McKayle & Co. • Hunter Playhouse, New York, NY. GAMES dramatically observes city children at play...the serious business of being a child. It is divided into three uninterrupted sections: 1) Play, where we meet the children, see their interaction, and experience the joys of childhood; 2) Hunger, which explores living and growing with deprivation; and 3) Terror, in which fear and brutality wipes away innocence. GAMES is unique in its presentation as dance theatre in that there is no instrumental music. Songs from the rich heritage of oral transmission in both the rural and metropolitan communities of the United States accompany the dance movement and are performed (a cappella by the cast of singers and dancers.

GAMES was premiered May 1951 at the Hunter Playhouse in New York City as Donald McKayle's initial full scale choreographic offering for his concert featuring his multi-cultural dance company Donald McKayle and Company. It was inspired by the streets of Harlem where these games were played and McKayle lived. GAMES has since been recognized as a modern dance classic and first appeared on the West Coast with McKayle's Inner City Dance Company, then shortly after with Lula Washington Dance Company. Because of its topic and enormous success in stage performances, it was refused presentation on the Fred Waring TV show but subsequently appeared on WCBS- TV "Camera Three" in 1955. It has been staged for the repertories of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Dayton Contemporary Dance Company, Dallas Black Dance Theatre, Ballet Hispánico, Feld Ballet, Cleveland San Jose Ballet among many others. The mounting of GAMES on the African American Dance Ensemble in 1986 was the pilot project that inaugurated the American Dance Festival's prestigious project. "The Black Tradition in American Modern Dance" which, under the sponsorship of the Ford Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities, has reconstructed modern dance masterworks on dance companies throughout the nation.


